When + subject + past simple ...

While + subject + past continuous ...

INTERMEDIATE "PAST SIMPLE" VS "PAST CONTINUOUS"

- 2) Past simple a fact Past continuous duration
 - PS: What **did** you **do** yesterday? - I **watched** TV.
 - PC: What were you doing yesterday at 8? - I was watching TV.

 INTERMEDIATE
 USE OF "WHEN" AND "WHILE"

 When + past simple, past simple

two consecutive actions in the past

I <u>opened</u> the door **when** the bell <u>rang</u>. **When** she <u>had</u> dinner, she <u>went</u> to bed





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USE OF "WHEN" AND "WHILE"

While + past continuous, past continuous

two simultaneous actions in the past

She <u>was reading</u> a book **while** her children were playing.

While she was studying, I was working.

USE OF "WHEN" AND "WHILE"

To express that a short action happened in the middle of a long action (or "interrupted" a long action) we use:

when + short action (past simple) while + long action (past continuous)

USE OF "WHEN" AND "WHILE"

Examples:

I <u>was washing</u> the dishes **when** the telephone rang.

The telephone rang **while** I <u>was washing</u> the dishes.

INTERMEDIATE PAST SIMPLE AND CONTINUOUS

These two tenses show different ideas:

- What did you do when it started to rain?
- We went home. (after it started to rain)
- What were you doing when it started to rain?
- We were going home. (before it started to rain)
